

Client Relationships: Avoiding the "It's Complicated" Status

On February 15, 2022, LAW held its virtual February Membership Meeting and One-Hour Dual Credit CLE: "Client Relationships: Avoiding the 'It's Complicated' Status." John D. Kitch, of counsel at Cornelius & Collins, presented the first half of the presentation, "It's Not You—It's Them: Red Flags to Avoid When Evaluating Clients." And Tyler Yarbro, the managing partner at Dodson Parker Behm & Capparella, and Erin Palmer Polly, partner at K&L Gates, presented the final portion of the CLE on "How to Break Up with Your Worst Client."

The panelists offered insight on how to deal with difficult clients, both before the attorney-client relationship is formed and once it is already established. John Kitch discussed numerous red flags to look out for when considering whether to take on the representation of a new client, such as the potential new client's reluctance to pay a retainer, whether other attorneys have previously represented this potential client on the same matter, if the potential client refuses to take your or the court's advice, and if the potential client approaches you right on the border of a statute of limitations or other major deadline, among other warning signs.

During the second half of the program, Tyler Yarbro and Erin Palmer Polly explored situations when lawyers may and must withdraw from representing a client, as well as the corresponding ethical rules and local rules governing those scenarios. The panelists offered helpful tips for managing these difficult client relationships and pointers for going about withdrawing as counsel.

Marketing Tips from Devon

Share content as much as possible, preferably at least 3-4 times a week. This can be regular posts, or even stories!


Ask friends with a bigger social media following to share your posts or information about your firm.

Use polls and Q&A's to engage with your followers.

Don't be afraid to share some of your personal life with your followers, if that is something you are comfortable with. It is good to separate your identity from just being a lawyer, as well as showing others the humanized version of yourself.

Share positive client reviews to show others the good work you are doing.

Have a succinct and aesthetically-pleasing bio, and make your contact information easy to find:



Your username should be your first and last name, which makes it easier for people to find your page.

Have a catch phrase in your bio – it makes you stand out!

Sharing legal tips with your followers is great! But be careful not to give <u>specific</u> legal advice to a specific person/follower, that can get you into trouble and potentially turn them into a client (or blur the lines in that regard).

Check your ego at the door, but BE **CONFIDENT** IN YOUR POSTS!




Belmont University Fellows Program
